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in *Minimal Words in a Minimal Syntax* the author combines a detailed description of the morphological structure of words in Swedish with a daring new approach to theoretical morphology based on the minimalist program of Chomsky 1995 as developed for syntactic structure. The X-bar theoretic approach to word structure of the Principles and Parameters framework is replaced by a rule-free approach incorporating only Merge and Move as structure-building devices. The author argues that stems have no word class features which are provided by inflectional affixes including theme vowels etc. Inflectional and derivational affixes differ only in the external syntactic requirement that inflectional affixes are associated with features that require checking in the functional domain. An important analysis of compounding is included where binding elements are analyzed as a result of structural antisymmetry requirements à la Kayne 1994. Old chestnuts of morphological theory such as the notion of a head of a word and the nature and structure of the lexicon are succinctly discussed in the light of the theoretical proposals advanced here. On the empirical side there are two lengthy chapters involving the semantic characterization of prefixes and suffixes in Swedish explaining their distribution in terms of types of Aktionsarten imposed by the affix on its host.

Syntax within the Word provides a multifaceted look into the syntactic framework of distributed morphology (DM) within the minimalist program. For those unfamiliar with the theory this monograph provides an overview of DM and argues its strengths. For those more familiar with DM this monograph provides analyses of familiar data, much of which has not been treated within the framework: argument selection, stem allomorphy and suppletion, nominal compounds in English (feet first vs. heads first) and the structure of the verb phrase. This monograph also proposes a future for the theory in the form of revisions to DM including the elimination of readjustment rules, a new economy constraint to minimize exponence that triggers fusion of functional heads, and a feature blocking system.

This clear and highly accessible descriptive grammar of English has a strong semantic and discourse-functional focus. It explains the basics of English syntax while providing readers with a comprehensive view of the richness and complexity of the system. Each structure is discussed in terms of its syntactic features, its meaning, and its uses in discourse.

This book is an introduction to word grammar, a theory of language structure founded and developed by Dick Hudson. In this theory, language is a cognitive network, a network of concepts, words, and meanings containing all the elements of a linguistic analysis. The theory of language is therefore embedded in a theory of knowledge in which there are no boundaries between one form of knowledge and any other. The most controversial idea in word grammar is that phrase structure is redundant because all its work can be done by means of dependencies between individual words. Word-word dependency is therefore a key concept in word grammar, and the syntax and semantics of a sentence is built upon this foundation. Contributors to this volume are primarily word grammarians from across the world. All the chapters here manifest the theoretical potentialities of word grammar, exploring how powerful word grammar is to offer analysis for linguistic phenomena in various languages. The chapters come from varying perspectives and include work on a number of languages including English, German, Japanese, Swahili, Turkish, and Ancient Greek. Phenomena studied include verbal inflection, case agreement, extraction, construction, and code mixing. This collection will be of interest to academics encountering word grammar for the first time or for those who are already familiar with this theory and are interested in reading how it has evolved and what its future may hold.

within a new model of language acquisition this book discusses verb second v2 word order in situations where there is variation in the input while traditional generative accounts consider v2 to be a parameter this study shows that in many languages this word order is dependent on fine distinctions in syntax and information structure thus within a split cp model of clause structure a number of micro cues are formulated taking into account the specific context for v2 vs non v2 clause type subcategory of the elements involved etc the micro cues are produced in children s i language grammars on exposure to the relevant input focusing on a dialect of norwegian the book

shows that children generally produce target consistent v2 and non v2 from early on indicating that they are sensitive to the micro cues this includes contexts where word order is dependent on information structure the children s occasional non target consistent behavior is accounted for by economy principles

miss middleton s scores are indeed a frozen moment in time which prove the existence in 1913 and 1914 of automatic phonic decoding of print as opposed to conscious psycholinguistic decoding of print the scores also prove that automatic decoding does result from the phonic sound method to teach reading since that is how miss middleton s children learned to read however the reading experts in 1914 and after must have misinterpreted scores like miss middleton s wildly fluctuating scores which obviously were the result of freely wandering attention by concluding instead that the scores had proved that the sound method had failed the truth is that such low reading comprehension scores on silent reading comprehension tests for phonic trained classes suggest the presence of healthy automatic conditioned reflexes in reading such scores may result from the miss middleton effect of voluntarily wandering attention while reading automatically her children simply did not bother to pay attention to what they were reading automatically but could have done so if they felt like it yet the inferior deaf mute sight word method forces children s attention to meaning or they cannot read at all they may therefore score higher on simple reading comprehension tests but far far worse on spelling and on reading correctly the actual words on the page
